Message from the Manse



Hello friends,

By the time you read this perhaps it's all over, but as I write this, it is currently election season and I'm sure I'm not the only one keeping an eye on the different policies, campaigns and intentions/promise that are being made. I do of course maintain that it's not good form at all to declare party affiliations as I preach or pastor to our community, but I must confess that I can't help but smile and giggle every time someone says "There should be no politics from the pulpit!".

At its heart, Christianity is deeply political and rightly so! Whilst its political it is NOT Party Political. There's no Methodist Church line on which party or candidates' people should vote for. But as a church born out of a heart for social justice, we are deeply political nonetheless, as we are concerned with seeing the world change for the better, in every way possible.

Election season is a time when we're all (I hope) thinking more acutely about the way our government spends money on different things, giving attention to different groups of people. At all times, I hope Christians are thinking about how time, attention and money can be focussed on the people that need it most.

Oscar Romero, a priest and later Archbishop in San Salvador, who was assassinated for his outspoken politics in favour of the poor, was canonised as a Saint in the Roman Catholic church in 2018. He's well known for standing firm to the teaching of 'preferential option for the poor', which is a part of Catholic social teaching but also a key emphasis in Methodism.

In this teaching, we understand that the Bible explicitly shows that there is preference given to the well-being of the poor and the powerless and it's with that in mind that we should all read the manifestos and policies for the parties and candidates hoping for our votes at the election. I often read them, wondering what differences the different ideas and ideologies will make to those who are poorest and most vulnerable in society, and indeed around the world.

In Whitchurch we can forget that there are many in our country and world who are struggling, and financially are finding it hard to even provide the basic needs. A conversation with a Food Bank volunteer sadly reminds us of the ever-increasing need of the food bank. The food bank is a necessary part of our community now; it's no longer a stop gap, it's a vital need. Often, we think of the food bank around winter time, and especially at Christmas. But in the summertime, we often have our minds on other things like holidays, trips to the seaside, ice cream and long summer evenings; it's easy to forget about the needs of others and to focus on our own.

In the Bible, Jesus reminds us often of our need to shift perspective, to see first from the point of view of someone less fortunate than ourselves, less well represented, less well able to speak up. I think if we all did this, the world could look quite different indeed. I encourage us in these months ahead (both pre- and post-election) to see where there needs to be change for those who are the least and lost in our community. So that they are not just looked after, but are treated as equals, precious in God's sight and in the eyes of our government too. Whatever the outcomes, may we always be deeply political voices, prophetic voices, which speak of the possibility of a different kind of world.

<u>Shropshire Historic Churches Trust Ride & Stride</u> <u>Event</u>

Once again, we have registered St John's with the SHCT fund raising event, **Ride & Stride** which this year takes place on **Saturday 14th September**, as part of Heritage Weekend.

This is a 3-pronged event.

1.) The church opens to visitors from 10am to 6pm with people manning it through the day. Visitors will come from across the county (and neighbouring ones) either walking, cycling, or riding horses **or in a car,** to as many churches/chapels as they can manage.

2.) Members of the church can Ride or Stride between as many churches/chapels as they are able in the time.3.) Participants (Riders, Striders and church sitters etc.) obtain as much sponsorship as possible. It is possible to Gift Aid which is a valued extra.

So, if you would like a morning or afternoon driving round beautiful Shropshire countryside, and raising funds from sponsorship at the same time, then this is your chance. After the event, all the Sponsor money is collected up and sent to the SHCT. The treasurer will then send 50% back to the nominated church/chapel ie. St. John's.

Anyone who is interested in being sponsored for walking or riding (a bike, a horse or in a car) round as many open churches/chapels as they can, please ask Chris Crowther for more information either at church or on 667282.

An excerpt from The Cottage Book (the undiscovered country diary of an Edwardian Statesman Sir Edward Grey. He was a Liberal MP for 30 years and GBs longest serving Foreign Secretary).

July 3rd 1900 It rains every day, so much that we do mind a little, though we don't complain because it is so much better than drought. Today I am going to London between showers, but we had two minutes of sun this morning and I stood in it and really felt it; it seemed quite strange. Sweetbriar is now well out. The cirl buntings are all right and I have several watchings of them. The goldfinches are feeding their young too, but they feed at long intervals, they bring them something invisible in their beaks and they take a long time to administer it to their young. Our rose-buds are struggling into flower one by one, but they are very sodden and humble.
