

Ride & Stride 2024 Saturday 14th September

Setting out at 10.20am from St. John's our first stop was St. Mary's, Whixall. The church was open but unmanned. We spent some time looking at the well-cared for church and graveyard and recognised some of the names on the gravestones.

From Whixall, crossing Dobson's Bridge, we made for Lyneal and Colemere, passing Northwood Methodist Church, where Elaine spent many enjoyable hours at the Wem Circuit Young Peoples Club. We arrived at Lyneal church which was a little distance from the centre of the village and again we found no one there but looked around. We noticed their "kitchen in a cupboard". Lyneal & Colemere church is dedicated to St. John the Evangelist. It seemed a large church for the area it was serving!

Making a small detour so that we could go through English Frankton, where Sarah's ancestors had lived, we arrived at St. Simon & St. Jude's, Cockshutt – again open for us to look round but unmanned.

By now we were in need of a cup of tea, so we think the Lord guided us to Weston Lullingford! We were warmly welcomed by four of the congregation, who offered us tea or coffee and home-made cakes. When they discovered we were Whitchurch people they proudly showed us their Joyce turret clock which was in good working order.

We next visited St. Raphael & St. Isadore, Petton, which was approached by a narrow track over a field. We decided to have our picnic lunch as the weather was lovely and we could sit on a bench with a lovely view. The interior of the church was very interesting with box pews and a minstrel's gallery and outside a mounting block and a working earth closet! The latter was decorated with flowers and pictures and a notice saying that it was twinned with an earth closet in Nepal! During our stay there the car had been inspected and well-licked by a small herd of young cows that were roaming about in the field. There were two grassy mounds in the field and we found out that they had been ice houses for the local Petton Hall.

On to Myddle and Loppington, again unmanned, but left out for us lovely home-made cakes and squash. We sampled the cakes and, as time was pressing, made for Edstaston, bypassing Wem and taking the by-roads. We were lucky that a member of Edstaston church turned up and told us a lot about its history. He pointed out the lovely Norman doorway and the wall paintings which they were obliged to preserve.

We then went over to St. Chad's, Prees for a brief visit, as they were locking up and then to St. Alkmund's in Whitchurch. The last three churches we visited were a bit rushed, but we arrived back at St. John's at 5.20pm.

It had been a very enjoyable and interesting day, and we plan to revisit some of the churches.



My friend Daphne and I set off from Whitchurch around 11am, after singing in Plum Tree Square with Whitchurch Singers, and our first port of call was The Holy Trinity Church, Bronington. A very peaceful church by a lake. Then on to St. John the Baptist, Bettisfield where the tomb of Lord and Lady Hanmer is to be found. Next to the tomb is a bench with a permanent sign on it saying reserved. Could it be for them we thought? We also visited the Primitive Methodist Ebenezer Chapel at Bettisfield. Built in the same year as St. John's 1879. It was closed but it's a lovely building. We went on to Welshampton, St. Michael and All Angels. They are holders of the best kept churchyard Gold award 2022, and Silver 2023. Also to be found there is the grave of an African prince. Then onto Colemere, St. John the Evangelist. They also have a number of awards for best kept churchvard. We had delicious coffee and cake there and they have a very clever foldaway kitchen at the back of the church.

On we went to Ellesmere and parked up at Ellesmere Methodist Church but it was closed. We had a late lunch in Ellesmere and then went to St. Mary's Church. A fine building in an elevated position with a fine view overlooking the mere. The tower was open but, after speaking to some people who had just descended the staircase, we decided against the climb. On our way back to the car we passed a lovely congregational chapel with a bright yellow door and just as I was taking a photo a man came out of it. He told us he lived there and it had been turned into apartments. On the way home we visited St. Simon & St. Jude at Cockshutt. They had an impressive bug hotel in the churchyard and they were advertising for people to make knitted/crocheted poppies for the church clocktower. That will be a lovely sight to see—I do hope they get enough! On we went finishing with St. Michael & All Angels at Loppington. They had a very fine collection of tapestries. We both enjoyed our adventure very much.

So on we go into October. We have the Art Exhibition and Recycled Fashion Show on the 5th and The Harvest Festival with Rev. Donna on the 6th. I'm looking forward to the first weekend.

Whatever you do in October I hope you enjoy the lovely mellow fruitfulness of the season.


