Message from the Manse

Hello friends,

A different point of view ...

I wonder if, like me, you watched the recent BBC drama "Ludwig"? - its on I player still if you didn't. It was certainly a good watch and one we all at the manse enjoyed watching.

If you haven't seen it, it's about 2 identical twins; one a puzzler setter and the other a police officer. When the police officer James goes missing, the puzzle setter John secretly steps into his place in order to work out what has happened to his brother. He pretends to be a police detective and he turns out to be remarkably good at solving murders. Not because he has the same skills and experience as his missing brother but because his brain, used to solving puzzles of a more theoretical nature, looks at things a bit differently. The missing brother problem never does get solved so I'm pretty sure there'll be a series two in the pipeline but in the meantime it's the idea of looking at things differently that got me thinking.

In many ways routines are wonderful things - they keep us safe, they make us efficient, they get things done but there's always the unfortunate possibility that we can get stuck in a bit of rut. How many times do you do the same supermarket shop to cook the same things? Or walk the dog on the same route through the same park? Or even do the same puzzle in the same paper? Sometimes these things are reassuring but sometimes it can suddenly feel a bit dull.

The same, I think, is true of faith - even though whatever He is or isn't I'm certain that God is neither dull nor routine! Humans though, well we can get stuck in a rut when it comes to relating to Him. Just occasionally it helps to shake things up. To talk to someone whose spirituality or beliefs are different from our own. To read something that makes us stop and think. To pray in a different way or with different people. To pick up a new Bible translation. To listen to music that we would never normally choose. We may end up back with our familiar favourites in time but a slight meander off the path brings new life and freedom to them.

So, this November why not challenge yourself - read something different (I have bookshelves groaning with suggestions, available only if you swap for something you think I should read!) or have a coffee with someone you only know in passing or cook something different and invite someone different to share it and while you're at it, why not ask God to reveal something new to you about who he made you to be? Anything could happen if you risk looking at things a little differently.

As a church we too need to start thinking differently, and trying out new things. As we know plan making is becoming increasingly difficult, and most quarters we have two or three local arrangement services. These services though do give us an opportunity to do something different and for all of us take part in worship. Instead of searching for others to lead, or even avoid the service all together, lets embrace it and use it as an opportunity to try something new.

At the joint service last Sunday we considered where we are going as a church and as individuals and what we hoped to pass on to the next generation. Not an easy one to address but one thing that struck me was that our biggest challenge was finding the opportunity to bring our Christian faith to others. BBT and More are two real opportunities we have taken. Perhaps we should be looking for others?

They do not need always to be group efforts. Individually we can demonstrate concern for others by helping our "neighbour" when opportunity arises or merely by being seen trying to live our life as Jesus would wish.

This reminds me of why as a teenager I left the church for six years before joining another church. When asked my reasons I answered that "The elders at the door smiled at you on a Sunday and ignored you on a Monday". I'm glad to say this never happened again and St John's is to me a seven day welcoming church.

The Corrymeela Community

When we lived in Formby on Merseyside we were members of the Methodist Church there and we became very friendly with the Minister, Rev Geoff Barnard, and his wife Audrey. They had met in South Africa where Geoff was ministering and Audrey was a missionary. After a period of time they decided to get married and return to Britain. Interestingly despite Geoff being a minister they had to pay back the cost of Audrey's fare out to South Africa as she had not quite been there the required length of time!

Audrey originated from Northern Ireland and was always very concerned about the troubles as she still had family there. When they visited they usually spent some time at the Corrymeela community so when Geoff retired they decided to move to NI and work for a few years in Corrymeela. When we met up with them it was always interesting to hear about the work of the Community in a country where there was such hatred between the Catholic and Protestant people.

Corrymeela is Northern Ireland's oldest peace and reconciliation organisation. It was founded in 1965 as a way of building a more peaceful Northern Ireland. During the conflict known as "The Troubles" they welcomed people from different sides and provided a way for them to meet safely, have difficult conversations and support one another inspiring people around the world to live out reconciliation in their daily lives.

Each year Corrymeela still hosts thousands of people, from diverse backgrounds and experiences, at the Ballycastle Centre, giving support and encouraging people from different backgrounds to live well together.
